Competent Authority

Here are some examples of Competent Authorities to guide you in selecting a certifier for you or your child.

General Education Teachers, School Principles, and Librarians should only be considered certifiers if they have a background or specialized training in special education, visual impairments, medicine, reading and literacy, etc.
